Citizen Satisfaction Survey

- Crime prevention satisfaction
 - In 2010 66% satisfaction vs. 60% in 2012
- Feeling safe in neighborhoods
 - 91% day, 69% night, overall City 78%
- 71% public safety priority over next two years
 - City focus crime prevention efforts

Communications

- Listed as a top priority
- Shoreline is maintaining an interest in preventing crime and keeping up with technology
- Major crime events
 - Need to put out timely/accurate information
- Large Police Response
 - K9, helicopter; improved feeling of safety reduce fear of crime
- E-Alert demo send info by neighborhood



Crime Prevention Efforts

- Streamline the process
- Update the Police web page
- Promote increase public interaction with Police
- Expand Block Watch Ancillary Duty





Investigative Efforts

- Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) detective to Shoreline Special Emphasis Team (SET)
- Clear objectives refocus investigative priorities and approach
- Change hours of operations (SET) align with crime patterns
- Weekly meetings top five/high impact offenders, include burglary detectives, SET, crime analysis



Community Policing

- Schools regular meetings between Schools, Police, Fire and OEM – ASAP interior/exterior lock downs
- Traffic refocus on neighborhoods, visibility, work with Public Works/Data Driven Policing
- Visibility unmarked to marked
- Parks Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)
- Code Enforcement regular meetings, coordinate efforts
