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1. If you moved away from the area for ten years, but came back when light rail is operating, and you looked around the 185th station area, what improvements would you hope to see there and where would they be located? How would you expect the area to change?

walkable plaza area - well lighted
Easier to bike + walk to station from East side of
Shoreline (15th Ave NE)

Safe to walk when dark
Some small retail but NOT extensive since
there is no I-5 exit there

2. What if you were gone for 20 years...what would you hope to see and where? How would you expect the area to have changed?

Larger trees but still well-lighted + safe
after dark
shuttle service to east + west

3. And what about in 50 years—what would you like to have in the area to support future generations?

better shuttle service to the station
still plenty of trees.

4. What is the most beautiful, memorable public place you've ever visited? Why was it so memorable?

aesthetically pleasing - walkways, art, people
there all day + evening, safe + active
well lighted; grass + plants, people of all
ages.

I love places with views of mtns + water also.
Maybe a water fall feature to cover I-5 traffic noise.

5. What are characteristics of public areas where you spend your time? Do they include plazas and art, a mix of uses, landscaping, and other ways to define public and private space?

Curves, not just straight lines
benches or somewhere to sit, rocks or a climbing
feature for kids, near park & grass, play area.

6. What attracts people of all ages, cultures, abilities, and interests to use public space?

spray park, access for all, community garden
bike ways, fountain or some ^{art} feature to gaze at.

7. How should new buildings contribute to the whole neighborhood as it redevelops gradually over decades?

interesting architecture, ~~not~~ buildings that will
last - bricks in walkways and buildings.
landscaping that is interesting & pulls you in.

8. Existing City policy directs the creation of more housing and choices for housing within walking and biking distance of the station. What are your ideas for where this housing will be located and the types of housing that should be considered?

Mix it up - not too much of one kind of housing in
one area. Coop housing, single family, senior
center/housing, good w/c access, apts, low-
income

9. Existing City policy directs the creation of employment within the station area and other locations in the city that will be well served by public transit. What are your ideas for what kind and where commercial & office uses should be located within the station area or within easy access of the station area?

ice cream / coffee / deli shops / small market
restaurant / craft store / hardware / bookstore

10. In thinking about the re-building of the 185th/I-5 overpass, what features will be important?

wider overpass - like on Mercer Island ^{I-90} & trees /
plantings on overpass.
