## City Council awards North City construction contract

Work will soon begin on Shoreline's North City Project. At its March 21 meeting, the Shoreline City Council awarded a construction contract to SCI Infrastructure, LLC, and construction is expected to begin in April. SCI was the lowest bidder of three contractors with a bid of \$6,563,802.

Improvements in North City are part of a series of capital projects designed to improve pedestrian and vehicle safety and revitalize the commercial area.

Last summer, Council decided not to award the construction bid for the original project design and asked for a redesign to maintain the four-lane configuration along 15<sup>th</sup> Ave. NE north of 175<sup>th</sup> St.

Design plans call for underground utilities, new street signals, six-foot sidewalks with four-foot planting and utility zones, curb bulb-outs, on-street parking, new storm drainage and road overlays. Additional items include benches, street trees and grates, concrete coloring and patterned sidewalks at intersections, printed crosswalks, pedestrian light poles and a gateway into the North City area. Construction is scheduled for completion in spring 2006.

## Council nixes Echo Lake site for city hall

At its March 21 meeting, the Shoreline City Council voted unanimously to terminate the purchase and sale agreement for the Echo Lake site under consideration for city hall.

Termination of the agreement was based on unresolved feasibility and cost issues raised during the 90-day due diligence period that began in December when the Council authorized the original agreement. Due diligence included evaluating environmental issues, soil conditions and development costs as well as negotiating development and cost sharing agreements with the property owners.

The Council indicated that it was still committed to building a city hall rather than continuing to rent space. The City Manager will meet with Council to review the analysis of the next sites on the previously adopted list of potential sites.

## 3rd Ave. NW Drainage Improvement Project

As anyone who's ever done a home remodeling project knows, construction can be unpredictable and the City of Shoreline's 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW Drainage Improvement Project is no exception. An unstable road base on 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW has created a situation where pavement is breaking apart under the weight of construction equipment.

The original plan was to patch and pave the trench on the west side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW only, but now the entire road is being rebuilt to make it structurally sound before completing the project.

The extra cost to rebuild the road requires cutting other items from the original contract to stay within budget. The deleted items will not affect the planned drainage improvements and the City will continue to look for ways to cut costs in other areas to main-

tain the original plan as much as possible.

Currently, the proposed changes include:

- The east side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW will be restored to pre-construction conditions and will not include additional landscaping.
- The ditches south of NW 185<sup>th</sup> St. on the east side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW will be filled and existing paved parking on the shoulders will be converted to gravel parking per the plan, but no new shoulder parking will be created.
- The ditches north of NW 185<sup>th</sup> Street on the east side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW will not be filled.
- Landscaping on the west side of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. NW between the sidewalk and the street will be seeded instead of planted with ground cover.

Another unexpected development is the discovery of a concrete

road under the pavement on Richmond Beach Road. This, too, has caused delays in the project. The old concrete road extends a few feet into the drainage trench and down Richmond Beach Road.

Patching and paving work on Richmond Beach Road began in early March and is scheduled for completion in April. The road is reduced to one lane of traffic between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and the traffic signal at the intersection of 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave. and Richmond Beach Road is not functioning during the road work. Traffic control signs, flaggers and a uniformed police officer guide motorists and pedestrians through the area and help keep traffic moving.

This year's event is from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Shoreline Park N' Ride on N. 192<sup>nd</sup> St. and Aurora Ave. N. To participate, residents must present the Clean Sweep coupon from the event flyer, or a valid photo ID with a City of Shoreline address. Event flyers will be mailed to all Shoreline addresses.

Due to the volume of material, only one trip is allowed per household. Items will be accepted until the bins are full, and the City

reserves the right to refuse any item. Please use the following guidelines in planning your trip.

**Do Bring:** All appliances\*; porcelain toilets and sinks\*; computers and monitors\*; telephones and cellular phones; scrap metal; motor oil and filters; antifreeze; lead acid batteries and household batteries; propane tanks\*; clean scrap lumber and pallets; chippable bulky yard waste; and televisions\*

\* Some items may require a minimal recycling fee that must be paid in cash. Check the Clean Sweep Recycling Event flyer for more details.

**Don't bring:** Hazardous materials, such as: household

chemicals, paint; cleaning products; pesticides; herbicides; solvents and thinners; or commercial waste or items infested by bees, hornets or wasps. The Aurora Household Hazardous Waste Site will take some of these items by appointment only. Please call (206) 296-4692 for an appointment.

## Richmond Beach bridge moves into design

The City of Shoreline is developing design plans for the new Richmond Beach Overcrossing Bridge.

The existing bridge has reached the end of the typical 50-year lifespan for a timber bridge. For safety, the City has imposed weight restrictions and built a median to keep weight off unsound support beams.

Final design for the reinforced concrete-through-girder bridge is expected this summer with construction scheduled for late fall. Completion of the bridge is scheduled for late summer 2006.

Plans call for a temporary detour bridge to be installed north of the existing bridge to allow access to 27<sup>th</sup> Ave. NW during construction. The 15-foot-wide temporary bridge will include a one-way travel lane and a three-foot walk-

way. The detour bridge will be in place prior to the removal of the existing timber trestle bridge and the start of new bridge construction.

Installation of the temporary bridge will require the removal of several trees. To offset this, native vegetation and trees will be planted as part of the project's environmental mitigation efforts after the new bridge is finished.

Construction costs for the bridge replacement are estimated at \$2.4 million. A federal grant from the Highway Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program provides \$2,276,692 with the balance, \$206,155, from the Shoreline's Roads Capital Fund.

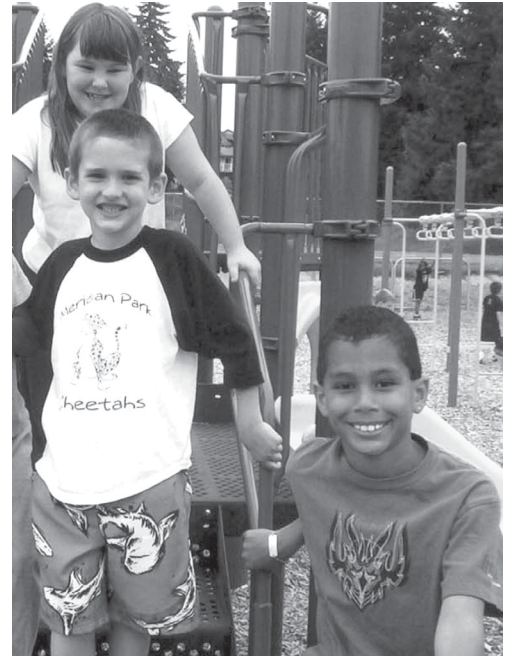
