I am writing to express the International Living Future Institute's support for the Shoreline Deep Green Incentive Program.

The Deep Green Incentive Program is an important tool for furthering the City's implementation of advanced sustainability within the built environment to meet city-wide goals and positions Shoreline as an international leader. It also encourages developers who are transforming the City to construct to the built environment's most rigorous performance standard - the Living Building Challenge™ and Living Community Challenge™. It calls for the creation of projects at all scales and typologies (neighborhoods/communities, new buildings, renovations, landscapes & infrastructure) to operate cleanly, beautifully and efficiently as nature's architecture - projects that generate all of their own energy with renewable resources, that capture and treat all of their water, and operate efficiently with maximum beauty & addressing equity all while meeting important implementation targets outlined in the Climate Action Plan.

The Living Building Challenge currently has over 350 registered project (both commercial and residential), including more than 60 renovations and existing buildings, that have declared their intent to pursue the Living Building Challenge.
