How do we strengthen well-being and how are we doing?


- · Who creates well-being?

- · How can you contribute?


Social Support

- Comes from family, friends, co-workers, etc.
- Is physical and emotional comfort & resources.
- Helps people cope with difficult circumstances.
- Can reduce emotional and medical problems from stressful events.
- Shoreline adults report high level of social support

Living with Poverty


- Results in poor health and educational outcomes
- Most common cause of hunger and homelessness
- Children and adults of color more likely to be living in poverty





Food and Housing

- Hunger: 8% of adults in north King County said money for food often or sometimes didn't last (2007)
- Shoreline food bank served 1,600 annually prior to recession



Health Insurance

 12% of adults under age 65 in north King County did not have any health insurance in 2007.

Overweight or Obese

- Lack of exercise and being overweight are risk factors for:
 - coronary heart disease
 - hypertension and diabetes
 - premature death
- 55% of Shoreline adults 18 and over were overweight or obese (2005-2007)

Safety

- Most Shoreline residents feel safe in their neighborhoods
- · Serious crime rates are down
- Gang incidents increased from 38 in 2007 to 83 in 2008

Discrimination

- Discrimination affects health, livelihood and well-being.
- Discrimination primarily based on age, gender, social class, race and ethnicity.
- 27% of adults in North Seattle/Shoreline experienced some type of discrimination (2001, 2004, and 2007).

Senior Disabilities

- 42% of adults age 75+ in King County have physical disabilities
- Disability rates among people age 60-74 are declining

Senior Income

 Poverty rate for seniors in King County increased from 7.3% in 2000 to 9% in 2006.

Senior Housing and Homelessness


- 6,700 people age 55 and older are on waitlists for subsidized housing in King County.
- Almost 1,000 people age 55 and older in King County are homeless.


Senior Trends for the Future

- 81% of baby boomers expected to work beyond retirement
- Many more older women will live in poverty than older men
- Disability rates increasing among females, low income, and less educated seniors
- Population of seniors living in poverty in King County projected to double

Academic Progress

 Shoreline students passed all four subject areas of WASL substantially above statewide rates

Graduation Rates

• On-time graduation rate for Shoreline School District was 78.8% (2006).

What's happening outside school hours

- About half of Shoreline youth participate in supervised afterschool activities 3+ days a week.
- Almost a third of high school seniors work 11+ hours a week.
- · 8th graders on an average school day
 - 30% spend 2+ hours at video games and computer fun
 - 40% spend 2+ hours watching TV, videos and DVDs

Ethnic Diversity of Students

 62% of Shoreline students are white, compared to 74% in the overall population

Poverty Among Children and Youth

 7% of Shoreline children (under age 18) live in poverty

Underserved Populations

Demographic trends

- · More older people
 - Proportion and number of older people will grow
- More people of color
 - Proportion and number of people of color will grow, especially younger children and schoolage children

Indicators of Well-being

- Need to increase
 - early learning and school readiness
 - parent support and effective parenting
 - protective factors for children and youth
- Basic needs and housing problems growing due to recession
- · Health problems due to obesity are growing

Services Offered

- · Need for bilingual and bicultural staff
- Unused capacity exists so be cautious starting new things

Senior Involvement

- Tap seniors as community resources
- Distinguish and address varied interests and needs
- Decreasing isolation is critical

Youth Involvement

- · Need to increase
 - early learning and school readiness
 - attachment to school and learning
 - protective factors for children and youth
 - awareness and prevention of gang crime
 - youth involvement in program design
