October 5, 2020

- March 27 Federal CARES Act appropriated \$2 trillion for COVID response
- April 27 State of WA awards \$300 million in Relief Act Funds to local governments
- June 8 Shoreline Council adopted Emergency Resolution No. 460 to enter into agreement and program the funds for use



- Six major categories
  - Medical expenses
  - Public Health expenses
  - Payroll expenses
  - Expenses to facilitate compliance with COVID-19 related public health measures
  - Expenses associated with the provision of economic support (including grants to small businesses)
- Any other COVID-19 related expenses reasonably necessary to the function of government

## Relief Funds – Eligible Uses

#### Expenses must be

- Necessary and incurred due to the COVID-19 public health emergency
- Not accounted for in the City budget most recently approved as of March 27
- A cost not considered to have been accounted for in a budget merely because it could be met using a budgetary stabilization fund



# Relief Funds – Adopted Funding/Implementation Plan

- \$981,100 City direct COVID-19 Response
- \$410,000 Small Business Support Program
- \$300,000 Human Services Support Program
- \$1,691,100 TOTAL



- Shoreline will receive an additional \$845,550
- Contract extended through November 30, 2020
- Council approval needed for contract amendment and revised use of funds
- Goal is to fully expend the CARES Act funds; Resolution will provide recognition of this complexity



# Relief Funds – Updated Funding/Implementation Plan

- \$1,374,381 City direct COVID-19 Response
- \$676,206 Small Business Support Program
- \$486,063 Human Services Support Program
- \$2,536,650 TOTAL



#### Relief Funds – In Action

- City Direct costs staff re-directed COVID work, unemployment, telecommuting expenses, PPE, social distancing implementation, distance learning support
- Business Grants would expand the program
- Human Service concentration on food access

- FEMA may disallow certain costs, that would then be CARES Act eligible
- Estimated costs may vary for distance learning camps, vehicle use, cleaning
- Unemployment costs not easily estimated



- Programs use in three categories
- Allows City Manager authorization to implement programs
- Allows flexibility to shift funds, as necessary
- Will provide Council with a final report
