Re: Save Trees on MUR-70' Zones; Council agenda item on 9/12/22

The parties below, as Shoreline residents, support the following proposed tree codes in MUR-70' zones:

- 10% tree retention for 70' buildings
- 15% tree retention for 80' buildings
- 20% tree retention for 90' buildings
- 20% tree retention for 140' buildings

Deep Green Incentive Program or built green programs will not cancel out tree retention.

Reasons to change the tree codes on MUR-70' zones:

- The proposed tree codes are a small compromise to clear-cutting trees on MUR-70' zones.
Example: If there are 23 significant trees on a MUR-70' building site, the proposed tree code means only two trees have to be retained.
- The City is committed to lowering greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) 60% by 2030. Established trees reduce GHG by storing carbon.
- Established trees are a cost-effective solution to climate crisis because trees store carbon, clean the air of pollution, and cool hot sidewalks.
- Science-based proof confirms established trees are climate crisis resilient and lower temperatures to prevent heat island effects.
- Heat islands will be created in MUR-70' zones if all trees are clear-cut.

Our stated reasons comply with Shoreline's Comprehensive Plan: Community Design, Element 2, Policies: **Policy CD16** - "Where feasible, preserve significant trees and mature vegetation."

Policy CD37 - "Minimize the removal of existing vegetation, especially mature trees, when improving streets or developing property."

We ask for City Council's approval of the proposed tree codes for MUR-70' zones when these codes come before Council on September 12, 2022.

We understand this petition will be submitted to the City of Shoreline and will be Public Record.
