**Meeting Minutes for the Parks, Recreation
and Cultural Services Board Meeting**

October 28, 2010
7:00 p.m.

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 7:06 p.m. Attendance was taken.

Park Board Members Present: Patricia Hale, Jesse Sycuro, William Clements, Boni Biery, Carolyn Ballo, Joseph Neiford, Kevin McAuliffe

2. Approval of Minutes

Mr. Clements moved and Mr. Sycuro seconded the motion to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

3. Approval of Agenda

Mr. Deal requested the agenda be modified to table item 7 regarding the tree ordinance due to further discussions by the planning commission, and to replace item 7 with a technical question about dogs on leash and interpretation of the ordinance.

Mr. Clements moved that the agenda be amended as proposed. Mr. McAuliffe seconded the motion. The motion carried.

4. General Public Comment

Fred Thomas, Shoreline

Mr. Thomas is a neighbor of the Richmond Beach Community Park Tennis Courts and opposes the proposed Pickleball lines for that location. He is concerned about the existing noise and over-use of the courts beyond posted hours and does not want the additional noise of Pickleball at this location just outside his home. He added that it is not conducive to rest and relaxation, which has been specifically recommended by his doctor. He also foresees potential conflict between tennis

players and Pickleball players, and recommends that if people want to play Pickleball that they go to neighboring City of Edmonds to play the game at an existing court there.

5. Bench Plaque Language Approvals

(a) CleanScapes Bench Language: The Board reviewed the proposed bench language intended to be posted on five benches along the Interurban Trail. There were several requests to alter the order of the wording slightly to accommodate intent and the number of characters limited per line. After some discussion, the Board counter-proposed that the bench plaque read:

Donated to Shoreline by CleanScapes
Waste Reduction Rewards Project
2010

Ms. Biery moved that the Board counter-propose and approve the amended bench plaque language. Mr. Clements seconded the motion and the motion carried.

(b) Duff Bench Language: The Board reviewed proposed Bench language from the Duff family. Mr. Clements moved that the Board approve the proposed language as presented. Ms. Biery seconded the motion and the motion carried.

6. Public Art Allocations

Ms. Bird gave a brief presentation on the current status of funding for the Aurora Art Banners (\$20,000 budgeted) and the Artist Consultant for the Park at Town Center Project (\$10,000 budgeted). Staff was requesting the Board approve the allocated but not yet transferred \$30,000 for both projects. These projects were both previously approved by the Art Committee earlier in the year.

Mr. McAuliffe moved and Mr. Sycuro seconded a motion to approve the allocation and transfer of funds to cover these approved projects. The motion carried.

7. Dogs On Leash and Ordinance Interpretation

Mr. Deal explained a recent concern over the interpretation of a park ordinance requiring dogs be (a) on leash in parks and (b) prohibited entirely from play areas. A question of interpretation arose when Seattle Youth Soccer Association (SYSA) asked a park patron to remove their on-leash pet from a soccer game at Hillwood Park. There was a sign on a neighboring school property fence that SYSA interpreted as permitting no pets on the field and was in accordance with SYSA's "no pets at games" rule, even though the game was taking place on park property and not school property. After some discussion, the Board agreed their interpretation and the ordinance's definition of the phrase "play area" was intended to cover an area with a play structure or playground rather than the "field of play" of a ball field. The exception to this is synthetic turf fields where pets are prohibited entirely. The Board recommended staff notify SYSA that their rules cannot

supersede the park ordinance(s). Staff agreed to copy the Board with the results of the SYSA notification and any subsequent discussion.

8. Pickleball

Mr. Deal gave a brief summary of recent requests for Pickleball in Shoreline, the recent resurfacing of the tennis courts at Richmond Beach Community Park and the department's intent to add Pickleball lines to this court to accommodate additional users. The application of the Pickleball lines was halted when residents objected to the lines being placed and the question was now being put before the Park Board.

Because of the comments presented earlier in the evening by the park neighbor and others against Pickleball, the Board agreed this was not the best location for a Pickleball court.

Ms. Ballo moved that the City not apply Pickleball lines to this location but perhaps look for alternate locations that might be less disruptive. Mr. McAuliffe seconded the motion and the motion carried.

9. Seal Sitters Beach Signage Program

Staff briefly reviewed the information in the Board's packet regarding signage samples from other local parks outside of Shoreline, with the intent of protecting endangered seal pups, how to proceed when a seal pup is found alone on the beach, etc.

Mr. Neiford explained that he worked closely with this group in several Seattle parks where these signs are located. His experience was that the signs were very helpful and recommended the signs be approved and installed at Richmond Beach Saltwater Park. Park Maintenance currently adheres to protocol established by the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife when young seals are reported on the beach.

The Board agreed that the signs would be welcome and helpful. They recommended placing permanent signs in active recreation spaces near the beach and hard surface area.

Ms. Biery moved that the board approve installation of the rectangular sign and to help the group craft language in accordance with other signage present at the park. Mr. Neiford seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Hamlin Dog Attack

On a related issue, the Board asked for a brief report on the status of the recent off-leash dog attack of a park user at Hamlin Park. Mr. Deal responded that neither the dog nor its owner was seen again. The police were not contacted by the victim so no police action has happened, though the incident was reported to King County Animal Control and a description of the animal was passed along. Staff

hope that off-leash enforcement staff may have kept descriptive records of the animals and owners that were being cited during a prior leash law enforcement campaign that included Hamlin Park. A leash law enforcement contract for Shoreline parks with an independent contractor is currently being developed.

10. Invasive Holly Study

Ms. Colaizzi reviewed the materials provided by EarthCorps on their Invasive Holly Study as included in the Board's packet and described her interactions with EarthCorps on the project. Because there were still some outstanding items being studied and final results were not yet available, she informed the Board that a summary report would be forthcoming from EarthCorps in 2011.

11. Parks, Recreation and Open Space (PROS) Plan Update

Ms. Colaizzi reviewed the materials sent to the Park Board in their packet and asked for their top three goals no later than November 18, 2010.

A question arose of the possibility of having Swingin' Summer Eve moved to Paramount School Park. Mr. Deal responded that was a possibility but that Cromwell Park was also an option.

Ms. Colaizzi led the Board through a review of PROS plan goals, taking their comments and feedback on the goals and policy points.

The Board agreed to form a subcommittee that would guide the majority of the edits, though all edits were welcome and appreciated. The Board agreed to provide any detailed feedback to Ms. Colaizzi within 10 days. The subcommittee will consist of Mr. Clements, Ms. Hale and Ms. Biery, and will meet in the coming weeks.

Specific feedback offered during the meeting"

Goal 1: add "pocket parks" under PR3

Goal 2: make PR9 to read "facilities equitably throughout"

Goal 3: PR11 would read "comply with" instead of "seek compliance"

Goal 4: (a) combine PR16 with PR17? (b) separate the PR to address specific partnerships? (c) suggest clarifying the current/existing vs. possible/future partners? (d) PR19 add athletic organizations/user groups and "facility users"

Mid-topic, Mr. Sycuro moved that the Board extend the meeting by 15 minutes. Mr. Clements seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Goal 5: The Board agreed that promoting and encouraging pedestrian and bicycle use in the community was a priority. Other edits included:

- PR20: create a more broad definition of the goal than the goal itself.
- Suggested swapping PR21 and the main goal language itself, as PR21 was a more broad description.
- PR37: rewrite as "healthy and active lifestyles"
- Suggested addition of education should be incorporated into one of the goals
- Consider sustainability as its own item

Goal 8: mention the celebration of our heritage but suggested calling it out as a priority.

Mr. Deal announced there was a very successful and well attended Hamlin Haunt. He also announced the Veteran's Day event on Thursday, November 11 at 2:00 p.m.

Ms. Bird invited the Board to the upcoming City Hall Gallery open house on November 8 just prior to the City Council meeting.

Ms. Colaizzi reminded the Board that the Richmond Beach Saltwater Park Off-Leash Area opens for seasonal use on November 1.

Ms. Cheeney announced and invited the Board to stop by and take in the sights at the Indoor Playground Halloween event on Friday, October 29 at the Spartan Recreation Center, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

Public Art Update for Parks, Recreation & Cultural Services Board

Action Requested: approval of artist for Town Center Design Team

- The interview panel, including Park Board Art Committee member Londa Jacques, unanimously recommends the acceptance of Elizabeth Conner as the artist on the Park at Town Center design team.

Three highly qualified artists were interviewed on November 15, 2010. Elizabeth Conner was recommended partly because of her enthusiasm for the site, Aurora Avenue and linear parks. She prefers designing with teams and likens the process to jazz, with riffs going back and forth. She is interested in engaging the public, using/re-using existing materials to tell a story and clearly pays attention to the history, sights, sounds, movement and potential uses for a site. Elizabeth believes that art can be used for discovery and to gather people in as well as guide them through a park.

In Installation phase:

- **Aurora Avenue** – Installation continues for “A Portrait of Shoreline in Time and Space”, artist Ellen Sollod’s pedestrian level treatments to the major intersections on the east side of N 175th and N 185th. Steel inlays depicting longitude and latitude surrounded by glittercrete are complete on the SE corner of N 185th & Aurora. Stainless cranberry inlays have also been placed at the Key Bank corner on N 175th. Inlays referencing Shoreline’s time zone plus directional markers and mirrored blue cast glass circles on the east side of Aurora are expected to be installed before the end of the year. Images on the west side of Aurora include area and zip codes and will be installed in 2011 toward the end of construction. Upon completion this artwork will “bookmark” the new Civic Center area with images that are uniquely Shoreline.

The Gallery at Shoreline City Hall:

- *Colors and Shapes*, paintings and photographs by four artists, continues in the 2nd and 3rd floor hallway galleries until January 28, 2011 and may be viewed any time during regular City Hall hours, M-F, 8:00-5:00, except holidays.
- An application has been submitted to Artech for a Public Art Grant to complete funding for our pedestal acquisition project. If allocated, these funds will augment the \$2,500 4Culture grant received and the \$1,500 included in the City’s Public Art Fund for 2010 – 2011 for this purpose.

Planning:

- Work continues on a Public Art Master Plan that is being developed in conjunction with the PROS plan update.

CHAPTER 3 GOALS AND POLICIES

This chapter describes the goals and policies that create a framework for future decisions for parks, recreation and cultural resources in Shoreline.

These goals and policies give the community a sense of direction and establish a method for achieving long term visions for the City's parks, recreation, cultural facilities and programs. These goals and policies have evolved based on community values, and are incorporated into the *Shoreline Comprehensive Plan: Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Element*.

Goals described in this chapter are the City's aspirations, and are intended to remain constant over time. The policies are more precise statements that describe how elements of the overarching goal can be achieved. The following goals and policies encourage:

- Providing a range of parks, recreation and cultural programs, experiences, and trail networks;
- Maintaining sustainable facilities including parks, open space, public art, recreation and cultural programs and services;
- Improving access to and usability of park, recreation and cultural facilities and programs;
- Coordinating with community partners to equitably distribute community resources;
- Involving the community;
- Creating diverse recreation programming that meets the community's needs; and
- Integrating cultural programs and public art into all aspects of community life.

GOAL 1 Provide Opportunities, Preserve and Maintain:

Preserve, maintain and enhance parks, recreation and cultural resources to ensure a broad range of high quality opportunities exist that enrich the quality of life for all Shoreline residents.

PR 1: Monitor changes in both existing and planned population and evaluate how the Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department can adapt to the needs of a changing population.

PR 2: Preserve, protect and enhance critical or unique natural features within parks — such as floodplains, stream corridors, wildlife habitats, shorelines and wetlands—, and educate the public on the importance of stewardship..

PR 3: Actively seek opportunities to preserve, protect and acquire open space and waterfront access.

PR 4: Reduce costs by seeking alternative funding methods to acquire, develop, renovate, maintain and operate facilities.

PR 5: Maximize the benefits from public lands for parks and programs by coordinating park planning and land acquisitions with those of other agencies providing similar services and with City plans for streets, utilities, and development.

PR 9: Distribute park, open space, recreation and cultural resources equitably by documenting gaps in service and where feasible providing resources to satisfy varying levels of citizen needs. .

G1 NP 1: Coordinate with other City departments to enhance and restore historic watersheds, in particular the habitat and flood protection functions of these natural systems.

GOAL 2 Maintenance of Facilities:

Monitor, evaluate and develop environmentally sustainable standards to maintain park facilities.

PR 6: Protect water bodies in park settings from degradation and seek opportunities to improve water quality.

PR 7: Utilize [sustainable best management practices](#), sound maintenance, design and development guidelines to ensure responsible stewardship of natural resources and habitat in the park system.

PR 8: Retain and develop underdeveloped public rights of way for public access and passive recreation where appropriate.

PR 14: When upgrading active recreation and sports facilities, maximize public use by utilizing designs that meet current industry standards and incorporate innovative, low-impact, development design and techniques.

PR 19: Reduce cost and create efficiencies by coordinating maintenance operations with other agencies such as but not limited to the Shoreline School District, Shoreline Community College, private schools, churches and athletic field users.

G2 NPR 1: Explore cost effective opportunities to maintain existing park, open space, recreation and cultural facilities through contracted services and volunteer opportunities.

G2 NPR 2: Create environmentally sustainable parks, recreation and cultural services programs and facilities that reduce waste, protect ecosystems and address the impacts of past practices.

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G2 NPR3: Create opportunities to educate “reduce, reuse and recycle” at City parks, recreational facilities, and cultural events by providing dedicated containers.

G2 NPR 4: Support and promote invasive species removal and native planting efforts to restore and enhance park habitat by providing volunteer coordination, technical assistance and restoration plans.

G2 NPR 5: Reduce potable water use in parks by using efficient, cost-effective fixtures, drought tolerant and native plants, and non-potable water sources for irrigation.

GOAL 3 Accessibility and Usability:

Seek increased opportunities for Shoreline citizens to enjoy parks, recreation, and cultural resources through improving accessibility and usability of existing facilities.

PR 10: Enhance the quality and variety of recreation and cultural opportunities in the park system to serve a wide range of interests and age groups.

PR 11: Work to ensure park and recreation facilities are accessible to all individuals and groups of all physical abilities, skill levels, age, income, and activity interest and compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

PR 12: Create ways to enhance public awareness of parks, recreation and cultural services facilities and programs.

PR 13: Seek to improve and expand indoor and outdoor recreation opportunities to reflect the diverse and changing needs and desires of the community.

PR 15: Seek to offer an expansive mix of passive and active recreation opportunities through both facilities and program offerings.

GOAL 4 Partnerships- Equitable Distribution of Resources:

Coordinate with community partners to create efficient and equitable distribution of community resources and facilities for Shoreline residents.

G4 NPR 1: Create partnerships with community resource providers such as but not limited to: the State of Washington, King County, Shoreline Community College, Shoreline School District, Dale Turner YMCA, Shoreline-Lake Forest Park Senior Center, Shoreline-Lake Forest Park Arts Council, Shoreline Historical Museum and, the Kruckeberg Botanic Garden Foundation to equitably distribute resources to Shoreline residents.



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PR 16: Coordinate with public and private school districts to allow school facilities to be used for park and recreational purposes after school hours in order to maximize the public benefit from existing resources.

PR 17: Develop alliances with public and private organizations to coordinate the planning and development of facilities and programs, avoid duplication and reduce costs.

PR 18: Actively involve stakeholders, users, and the community in the development and management of park, recreation, and cultural services.

PR 20: Seek to develop mechanisms for communication and coordination among community resource providers in Shoreline.

GOAL 5 Encourage Pedestrian and Bicycle Travel:

Encourage pedestrian and bicycle travel by identifying and developing facilities and routes to link Shoreline residents to parks and community resources.

PR 21: Encourage development of bicycle and pedestrian facilities and routes including those identified in the City of Shoreline Transportation Master Plan.

PR 22: Develop trail systems within parks and improve access to parks for bicyclists and pedestrians.

GOAL 6 Public Involvement:

Encourage consistent and effective public involvement in the short and long-range park, recreation and cultural services planning process.

PR 24: Encourage, record, and track citizen responses to specific programs, facilities, and policies.

PR 25: Partner with community resource providers and use various community outreach methods to monitor park, recreation and cultural service preferences, needs, trends and citizen satisfaction.

PR 26: Provide public review opportunities in park, recreation and cultural services planning decisions.

PR 27: Monitor, evaluate and adjust public relations and publicity efforts to inform citizens of the park, recreation and cultural opportunities available citywide and in neighborhoods.

PR 28: Encourage citizen involvement and participation in assuring the quality of park development and maintenance through various volunteer opportunities.

GOAL 7 Diverse Recreational Programming:

Seek to provide a comprehensive, broad, diverse and flexible program of recreation and cultural services to meet the active and leisure needs of diverse populations, age groups and interests.

PR 29: Take a leadership role in building alliances fostering communication and coordination as the City and other organizations strive to satisfy the recreation and cultural needs of Shoreline residents while limiting duplication.

PR 30: Align program and service offerings with the core mission while remaining flexible, filling service gaps, and adjusting to trends in order to serve a variety of ages, interests, abilities and the diversity of cultures represented in our City.

PR 31: Monitor, evaluate and adjust recreation and cultural offerings on a routine basis to correspond with needs assessment findings and respond to changes in citizen needs and desires.

PR 32: Offer children's and family programs during times that meet the growing needs of working parents.

PR 33: Provide a diversity of program options for middle and high school youth, and build alliances with other service providers to implement Council priorities related to youth services.

PR 34: Monitor, evaluate and adjust offerings to address service gaps in specialized recreation programs for City residents with developmental disabilities.

PR 35: Assure the Shoreline Pool's program services are available to infant through senior adult-aged participants at times that meet the needs of all individuals.

PR 36: Support the provision of senior adult, arts, and cultural history programs through alliances and joint planning with service organizations.

PR 37: Respect and celebrate the diversity of cultures represented in our City through recreation programs.
